Dear Beloved Ones,

I'll be honest, I am not usually into poetry. I appreciate it as an art form, but it's not usually my go-to source of art when I am seeking inspiration. My reasoning for this is that I am simply too impatient to appreciate poetry. I don't take the time to understand how the words melt together to form a deeper meaning. I am usually in a rush, I need the message given to me straight.

But there is one poet who forces me to slow down, Mary Oliver. Each of her words leans into the next one and I find myself not wanting to stop reading her poetry. She says, "Poetry, to be understood, must be clear... It mustn't be fancy. I have the feeling that a lot of poets writing now, they sort of tap dance through it. I always feel that whatever isn't necessary should not be in the poem." The subject of much of her poetry is nature, and I ^Pind myself drawn closer to God's presence when I read her beautiful poems. I am telling you about her because sadly, she passed away on Jan. 17th. Ms. Oliver won the National Book Award and the Pulitzer Prize and was known as being our country's best-selling poet. She spent most of her life living in Provincetown and was inspired by New England's rocky shores and stormy winters. For her, paying attention to nature was the springboard for the sacred. These wintry, dreary days with little sunlight and less warmth can feel like they drag on forever. So, I'll share with you a poem that helped me appreciate the snow a little bit more. It's called *The Storm*:

Now through the white orchard my little dog romps, breaking the new snow with wild feet. Running here running there, excited, hardly able to stop, he leaps, he spins until the white snow is written upon in large, exuberant letters, a long sentence, expressing the pleasures of the body in this world. *Oh, I could not have said it better myself.*

Since she passed away, it's fitting for us to remember her poem When Death Comes, here is an excerpt:

When it's over, I want to say: all my life *I was a bride married to amazement.* I was the bridegroom, taking the world into my arms. When it's over, I don't want to wonder *if I have made of my life something particular, and real.* I don't want to find myself sighing and frightened, or full of argument. I don't want to end up simply having visited this world.



If you like these two poems, I'd encourage you to read more of her work. "Devotions," is a book that was published in 2017 and it's a section of her most-loved poems from across all her publications. It is a great place to start.

In the meantime, I hope that you're able to slow down and draw closer to God in these long, dark, wintry days.

In the last month articles have been in the Hilltop and blast, giving you the news that we are falling short of our 2019 budget needs. The Finance and Stewardship committee and Parish Council believe it is extremely important that you all understand that we have scrutinized the budget. With the few exceptions noted below, most committees are requesting a flat budget from last year. So why are we short?

In recognition of our dedicated, high performing staff, Parish Council has proposed a nominal 3% increase in salaries and impacted pastoral expenses.	Increased expense	+\$,2246

Parish Council has budgeted for additional revenue from fundraising. It is our expectation/hope to hold more, highly successful events. This is an extremely aggressive goal, one that we will need considerable effort from the congregation and their friends to help us achieve.	Increased revenue	+\$2,250

As we communicate these discouraging 2019 figures, we have wonderful news to share about the 2018 budget. As this congregation often does, our committees, members and attendees rallied and we are finishing 2018 with a surplus of greater than \$10,000. This leads to two questions: How did we end up with such a large surplus in 2018? While the budget has lots of line items of plus and minuses, the short answer stems from two factors:

-We had a good winter and plowing was under budget by \$4,800. (This is New England. We cannot plan on it *not* snowing.)

-Our pledges and loose offerings were more than \$14,000 more than budgeted based on committed pledges.

The second question is, if we had a surplus last year why are we still conducting a second mile campaign for 2019? As a matter of fiscal responsibility/best practice we should be endeavoring to plan for a balanced budget. As you prayerfully reflect on this second mile request, remember that we had a surplus in 2018 primarily because people gave more than their official pledges said they would. We are asking everyone if they can commit to the same/true amount that they gave in 2018 for 2019-- and maybe a little more.

Please know you are a beloved child of God and this congregation regardless of what you decide to do in response to this plea.
