Dear Church Family,

They say that Christmas is for the children. The cookies, the twinkly lights, the presents opened early on Christmas morning, the cozy pajamas and Christmas movies. They say that Christmas is for the children. After all, children are full of hope, of joy, of love, wonder and curiosity. But perhaps us adults need Christmas as much as the children do, maybe more.

It's a brutal world out there. Jobs are stressful. We have bills to pay. We have a fractured political system. We don't get along with our families. Our bodies hurt and our medical care is expensive. We're aware of much of the violence, unrest and corruption in nations around the world and here at home. Climate change is flooding Venice and bringing our world to its knees.

Jesus was born in the middle of a geopolitical conflict under the rule of Herod, a villainous despot and puppet-king of the Roman Empire. From what we know in the Gospels, his parents were made very vulnerable because of his birth. Being young and unmarried, they didn't have the familial or social standing that one would think was required of people who were going to be the parents of the revolutionary messiah. And yet, that's who God chose. They could have focused on the stress, the lack of money, the lack of a safe place to live. They could have worried about their strained family relationships and the political unrest all around them. They probably felt like their world was being brought to its knees. And maybe they did worry about these things, they were human after all, but they trusted as well. They trusted God. They leaned into their faith and said, "yes" when they could have said everything but. They chose to see the possibility of hope, joy and love in a world full of despair. The anticipation of a baby being born has the tendency to do that to us.

I know this is often thought of as a season for children, but grownups need Jesus just as much as the children do. We need joy, love, wonder and curiosity as well. We need hope amidst despair. We need to have the eyes to see God at work all around us in the sparkle, the celebrations and decorations. After all, we're the ones worrying about so many different things. We should remember that the baby boy, the embodiment of love and light and hope, was a beacon for all of us, especially us grownups. We see all the cracks in the world, in our lives, in our communities, we need to see the divine light streaming in.

Remember, Christmas is for the children, but it's for you, too. You deserve to experience all the hope, joy, love and peace of this sacred Advent season. Jesus came for you too.

NEWS FROM THE TRUSTEES CHURCH STEEPLE!

The Church Bell tower Refurbishment update: Next time you are walking into the church look up. Notice anything different? Our bell tour was just given a makeover. We replaced all the roof shingles so they now match the new shingles on the church itself. We replaced both windows on the tower. If you hadn't noticed one of them blew out in a storm a couple of years ago. We also had all the cedar shingles replaced with no maintenance siding that is designed to look like cedar shingles. While the company was doing all this work they also replaced some of the rotten trim work and repainted the rest of the tower. Look up, its looks really impressive to see.

NOVEMBER PC SNIPPETS

Much of what was discussed at Parish Council this month; will be addressed in future Hilltop articles.

- -In honor of Charles Onthank and other loved members of our church community, memorial funds will be used to install additional railings in the front of the church to assist those with limited mobility and sight navigate the walkways. We hope to have these installed in the next few months, hopefully before the bad weather.
- -Delaying the bad weather would also be good for the budget. You might recall that at the annual meeting we approved a deficit budget of nearly \$19,000. As of the October financials, our budget is trending that we will end up with a deficit but nowhere close to the originally proposed deficit. It wouldn't hurt to help the budget and say a few prayers for a gentle winter season!

MASS CONFERENCE ANNUAL MEETING

On November 1st and 2nd I attended the Annual Meeting for the Massachusetts, Connecticut and Rhode Island. On Friday afternoon we have several informational workshops we could choose to attend. I attended, "Bringing New Life as Agents of Change." It was very interesting to hear what churches are doing when faced with the challenge of declining membership or gaining space that was once rented for income. Needless to say a lot of thought and soul searching went into the decisions these churches made. It was interesting that their thinking went beyond the church membership numbers or budget, but what did they have to offer to the community. After dinner we all joined together for a very moving worship service.

Saturday morning started with another moving worship service and communion followed by the keynote speaker. Valerie Kaur, the keynote speaker is a Sikh racial justice activist, civil rights lawyer, award winning film maker, educator and author of,

"Revolutionary Love." Her message about making love a public ethic was very inspiring. After lunch business meeting commenced. This was the first meeting under our new conference, the Southern New England Conference of the United Church of Christ. Over 770 delegates voted in favor of adopting the new name, proposed foundational justice commitments for the new conference, revision of the bylaws of the new conference and board members.

In addition to the worship, keynote address and business meeting attending the annual meeting is a great way to network with other churches, justice groups and organizations.


