Dear Church Family,

When you read this, it will be the year 2021, thanks be to God! I don't think we've been this excited about a new year since the clock struck midnight in the year 2000. We exhaled a collective sigh of relief when we didn't succumb to a global computer glitch. As this year draws to a close, I think we're all exhaling a collective sigh of relief because it's over. A vaccine is making its way through our communities, many of us are praying for a "normal" summer, fall and winter next year. I can only dream of how lovely it'll be to be back in our sanctuary next year for Christmas Eve. I don't want to put together another Zoom Christmas Eve service. Indeed, we have much to look forward to, but surely, we learned something from this pandemic time? This is (God-willing) the only time in our lives when we will have had such an experience. While it was awful much of the time for many different reasons, I know we learned something from this liminal time, this pause. In reflecting on the prior year, here's what I am going to take away from it:

- -I really do enjoy working from home. That being said, so much is lost in working from home. I have missed the informal conversations with Bobbie and others who pop into the church office, the phone calls that I'm able to take on the spot rather than returning messages. In 2021, I'll be back in the office as much as I am able, while remembering the benefits of working from home.
- -One silver lining was being able to spend so much more time with my child than I would have otherwise. I would have missed many bedtimes because of church meetings. I am grateful that Zoom meetings allowed me to quickly toggle between being a pastor and a mom, and I will treasure that time we shared, even if it was amidst a pandemic.
- -I actually connected more with friends and family than I would have otherwise. We had more Zoom gatherings and phone calls than we used to. I am going to continue to put in the effort to sustain those relationships even when the pandemic is over.
- -The car parades were wonderful. They allowed us to see folks who haven't been to church in ages and to spread love and cheer around Burlington. We should consider how we can continue connecting with folks in unique and fun ways even after the pandemic.
- -The town came out for our small businesses. We stepped up and we supported them in order to help them survive this very challenging year. I hope that one lesson we take from this is not to take our small businesses for granted, and to continue to spend our money in ways that support our local economies.
- -We also came out in support of our essential workers, everyone from the frontline nurses, doctors and CNA's to the grocery store cashiers. We realized that many people who keep our world turning are underpaid and undervalued. I hope that going into the new year, this appreciation and gratitude will not dissipate and the people who are underpaid will see wage increases.

- -Creativity! The music, art and poetry people produced from home has been incredible. I am thankful that this art will serve as a time capsule, helping to capture the feelings and emotions of the moment for the history books as Covid retreats further and further into the rearview mirror.
- -Most Americans are very financially vulnerable. This pandemic exposed our nation's ever-increasing wealth gap. I hope that our political and economic leaders learn from this, and we work to create a nation in which wealth is more evenly distributed, so that millions of Americans don't have to live paycheck to paycheck.
- -The labor that mothers pour into the home and into the economic market is highly undervalued. Our economy is built on the unpaid labor of parents (primarily mothers) who work outside the home and take on the bulk of domestic responsibilities, and it isn't sustainable. I hope that affordable childcare, paid parental leave and more flexible workplaces will emerge from this pandemic, otherwise it will erase decades of progress in our efforts to achieve gender equality in the workforce.

That's all I've got for now. What lessons from the pandemic are you taking with you into 2021? Did you learn a hobby? Come to appreciate something you hadn't before? Please tell me, I'd love to hear from you.


There was discussion about what we are already doing and what else we could do to connect with people, especially newcomers, when all worship is on Zoom.

I am sure most of you are as ready to put 2020 behind as I am. Last year was a tough year for our church and for us individually as well as collectively. Thankfully, technology helped to bring us together and kept us out of isolation.

Since October, Parish Council (PC) has been hard at work developing and refining the proposed 2021 budget. Given the uncertainty of 2021 and the anticipated rental shortages, developing a budget has been difficult. PC members have been steadfast in considering our options, reaching out to parishioners requesting their pledges, and determining how financial needs can be reduced. As I write this we have reached 78.4 percent of our 2021 goal of \$203,545.

We will get through the malaise that beset us last March. Although not as soon as we would all like and perhaps not all at once, we will return to in-person services in our sanctuary. We also anticipate continuing to use Zoom as a connector to those who live afar or who are housebound. I look forward to seeing you at first virtually, and before you know it, again in the sanctuary. I have high hopes for 2021.

Our congregation has helped make everything work because you care and give of yourselves, spiritually, actively, and financially.
