### Pastor-al Ed-i-bles...

Dear Friends in Christ,

When I was a young kid, Easter was a third-rate holiday for me. It was tied with Thanksgiving, but lagged well behind Christmas and Halloween on my excitement meter. Easter meant waking up to a basket filled with colored jellybeans and a chocolate bunny sitting amidst a ball of green plastic grass. One year, I remember, there being a wondrous, surprising bonus: a new, bright white softball!

But regardless of what my basket contained, when the candy was gone, Easter was over. So, Easter didn't last long when I was a young kid!

As a teenager, Easter meant fending off an urge to sleep later because I arose very early to attend a sunrise service held on the East-facing porch of an old farmhouse on a hillside. A hearty breakfast redeemed the early wake-up call, but I was always tired afterwards and kind of glad Easter came only once a year. Easter didn't make a deep impression on me when I was a teenager!

In college, I followed my curiosity about my faith, and I looked at Easter through a new lens. It became an intellectual phenomenon to be explained and a problem to be solved. Eventually I conceded: Easter was a mystery of faith to be embraced or rejected. Easter as an intellectual problem didn't linger long in my life!

Once I became a pastor, I embraced the Easter's wondrous mystery – so I could preach as well as teach about it each year. And, I integrated its wondrous joy into my pastoral care when a walk alongside those who were facing dying or just wondering about life beyond this life.

Now, I find myself having become a “senior citizen,” Easter has grown to become my new, number one holiday, ahead of even Christmas (except perhaps on Christmas morning when young grandchildren are around). I appreciate the hope and possibility Easter offers the world, especially in a moment when the world seems to be “groaning at so many points” - in our atmosphere, in a pandemic, in the Ukraine, and in our divided society. And, I personally appreciate the hope and possibility Easter presents to me as each day of my fleeting life rushes by.

Easter is a mystery, a wondrous story of hope - and possibility. Its message is simple and complex, timely and timeless. Easter's word is this: Out of *any* kind of dying, God may bring forth new life!

So, now, Easter, for me, is lasting and eternal! I believe It will be with me and in the world in which I live for the rest of my days! And with the Psalmist, I say, “I shall dwell in the House of the Lord forever.” But, now, what about you? What kind of holiday is Easter is for you?

The Deacons welcomed new member Kari Lynch to the Board.

As this was the first meeting after the church Annual Meeting, members chose their roles for the year to come. They are: Deb Glancy, chair and tech liaison; Bobbie Killilea, secretary and Called to Care liaison; Dave McNeil, treasurer; Kari Lynch, fellowship; Marcia Rich, Special Music Committee liaison and Memorial Fund Coordinator.

As has been the practice in recent years, the Deacons reviewed their responsibilities as outlined in the church constitution. These include: 1) supporting worship by working with the pastor and music director, securing pulpit supply and coordinating support roles for worship such as ushers, greeters and lay leaders; 2) care of members and friends of the congregation through efforts such as Called to Care; 3) development of fellowship programs for the congregation and to attract potential new members and church communications such as the Hilltop Herald; and 4) spiritual welfare of the congregation through Memorial Funds and the collection and confidential administration of the Deacons Fund/Love Offering to help members in need.

The Special Music Committee budget request for 2022 was approved. It includes money for some of the guest musicians and miscellaneous items.

Holy Week services were planned. Bobbie will order and pick up palms for Palm Sunday, which will be made available to people worshipping via Zoom. The Maundy Thursday service is scheduled for 7 pm on April 14; it will also be available through Zoom. On Good Friday the church will be open noon to 3 pm for quiet meditation. Everyone is invited to decorate the sanctuary for Easter on Saturday morning, April 16 at 9:30. The Christian Education Committee will lead the 6:30 Sunrise Service, which will be followed by coffee and donuts. Family worship will be at 10:30, with an Easter egg hunt beforehand.


The Deacons continue to monitor the COVID positivity rate in the area to get a sense of when it will be safe to resume coffee hour and no longer require masks during worship.

## TRUSTEES NEWS EDUCATION BUILD CHIMNEY REPAIR



As the Trustees were getting estimates to replace the asphalt shingles on the Bedford Street side of the interconnect and Education buildings, it was noticed that the large chimney needed to be repointed. Cuccio Masonry was hired to do the work.

The work started in mid-March with a set of staging being put up around the chimney. Under closer inspection of the chimney, it was realized the chimney had more damage from water getting in the chimney that was initially seen from the outside. The top flue and at least 12 rows of brick and the chimney cap had to be replaced. Work completed the end of March.

C4C is still meeting via Zoom on Thursday afternoons from 1- 3PM. We are making strips for another prayer shawl this time in shades of blue. We are looking forward to moving our meetings out of doors as soon as the weather is warm enough. All are welcome to join us. Contact information can be obtained from Susan Eby.

Missions met on March 21 via Zoom. We wish to report that a check was sent to Lowell Transitional Living Center for \$2503.90 which was 50% of the Christmas offering.

The special offering taken on March 27 will go to One Great Hour of Sharing to support its many projects.

For the Easter offering Missions decided to suggest to PC that the 50% of the Easter offering set aside for Missions to distribute will be split. Half of what is given to Missions from the Easter offering will go to Church World Services, specifically for its work in Ukraine. The other half will go to Project Bread for its work distributing food in the Boston area, including People Helping People in Burlington, for those who are experiencing food insecurity.

Please note that Church World Services has set up a special way that money one donates to CWS will be used for Ukraine relief. If you wish to personally give more to CWS to support their work in Ukraine write on the check that the money is for account 6642 (Ukraine).

On Mother's Day, May 8<sup>th</sup>, there will be another special offering called Blanket Sunday. There will be special envelopes in the Sanctuary and the Office for your donation. You can also send a check to the office made out to UCC Burlington and clearly marked for Blanket Sunday. You may also give digitally using Vanco.

This special offering will support the work of Church World Services. CWS's web site states the following:  
"Since its formation in 1957, the United Church of Christ has worked with Church World Service (founded in 1946) to accomplish more together than it could alone, joining hearts and resources to create a tradition of help and a legacy of hope. When disaster strikes, Church World Service is the primary agency through which the UCC gives support for relief and recovery efforts. This assistance may take the form of winterized family tents for Pakistani earthquake survivors, food packages and tankers full of water for displaced people in violence-torn Darfur, Sudan, or long-term recovery assistance for families affected by hurricanes, tornados, or flooding across the U.S.

- The UCC and CWS are empowering grassroots development with neighbors around the world.
- The UCC and CWS are one in response to, and advocacy about, the ongoing daily disaster of grinding poverty.
- CWS supported the UCC in the production of the documentary "Troubled Waters," highlighting the vulnerability of 1.2 billion people worldwide due to the lack of adequate water and sanitation.
- CWS and the UCC work together for people-centered policies. UCC members play an important role in CWS's web-based Speak Out advocacy ministry, making their views known to Congress on issues affecting people in need.

When difficult times happen, a kind and loving response can make all the difference. That's why the CWS Blankets program was created—to give a kind, loving and tangible response to someone facing a difficult time, reminding them that they are not alone. Through the generosity of CWS partner organizations, congregations and individual supporters, our most vulnerable neighbors around the world can feel safe and keep warm with fresh linens and clean sleeping quarters."

## MISSIONS TREASURER'S REPORT

After much discussion two additions were made to our list of Benevolences. In 2022 we will donate \$400 to DIGDEEP and the Global Leadership Community, as well as to the 21 organizations/non-profits we supported in 2021. DIGDEEP is a human rights non-profit working to ensure that every American has clean, running water. They are currently engaged in a Navajo water/solar panels project. This effort to support Native American Indians was recommended by Roberta Low. The GLC was founded by Michael and Kristen Badriaki. Michael is the son of Molly Kyokunda. Three acres of land have been acquired in Uganda. The goal is to build a school that will teach leadership skills, combined with Christian values.
