The meeting started with a welcome to new member Jan Costa.

The board decided to continue with the previous year's division of responsibilities in lieu of having a chairperson. Deana Tredeau will attend Parish Council and write vouchers; Dave McNeil will continue as treasurer and Bobbie Killilea as secretary; Kari Lynch is the Safe Church representative and will work on Fellowship with Jan Costa, who will also be the Called to Care contact, and Marcia Rich will run the meetings and continue as Memorial Fund Coordinator.

As Andrew participated after being on parental leave, the December 24th services were reviewed. All were considered to have good attendances, with over 100 people at the 4 pm service. There was some discussion of moving the late service from 11 pm to 10 pm next year.

The lay leader guidelines were finalized. Andrew is putting together a template to help lay preachers and others with worship planning, such as who is responsible for what parts of the service and where to find helpful resources. The deacons are also assembling a booklet of guidelines, policies and procedures for responsibilities that fall in the Board's area, such as communion preparation, weddings and funerals.

Andrew is preparing a three-session class for potential new members. Eight people have expressed interest; if you are interested and have not spoken to him, please contact him.

The labyrinth will be available for contemplative walking on three dates in Lent; see above article in this Hilltop for details.

Initial plans for Holy Week were discussed. The Presbyterians will join us for Maundy Thursday and they will offer an activity at their church on Good Friday. On Easter, worship will begin at 10:15 for decorating the cross with flowers. Four ushers will be needed for the service.

All are invited to help decorate the sanctuary for Easter on Saturday, March 30 at 9:30 am.

## ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING (OGHS) MARCH 3rd

Our Church has 5 special offerings per year. The first of these offerings occurs on March 3<sup>rd</sup> during Lent and is the One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS).

The One Great Hour of Sharing's website states the following;

"One Great Hour of Sharing, part of Our Church's Wider Mission, is the special mission offering of the United Church of Christ that carries God's message of love and hope to people in crisis. The UCC works with international partners to provide sources of clean water, food, education and health care, small business micro-credit, advocacy and resettlement for refugees and displaced persons, and emergency relief and rehabilitation. One Great Hour of Sharing also supports domestic and international ministries for disaster preparedness and response.

On average, of every dollar given to One Great Hour of Sharing, 95 cents are used directly for mission programming; and 5 cents for interpretation materials."

#### SEWALL HALL STAGE IS NOT A STORAGE AREA



Occasionally, our rentals require the use of the stage in Sewall Hall for their events. This ends up being a clean-up event for Bobbie and the Trustees to clear the stage so it can be used by the rentals.

As a reminder for everyone, the stage in Sewall Hall is not a storage area!

For the people who have been storing their stuff on the stage, you need to remove it by **Saturday, March 16**th. Any items remaining on the stage thereafter will be disposed of.

Items intended for Church events (ex: annual auction, plant sale) can be left on the stage in advance of the event.

## GIFT CARD PROGRAM TIME TO ORDER GIFT CARDS FOR EASTER!!!



We have a very easy fundraiser that you may not know about - it is ordering Gift Cards through a program called "RaiseRight." When you order your gift cards through RaiseRight, a percentage of each card is donated to the church. You still get your Gift Card at full value, so no worries. It's a win, win for both!

If you order physical cards by March 10th, the cards will arrive here for distribution on Palm Sunday, March  $24^{\rm th}$ .

When you use the RaiseRight Program, you may also purchase e-cards and even reload many physical cards. One of our members reloaded an Olive Garden physical card while eating out when she realized the bill was going to be more than the value of the card. It is very easy to use.

The gift cards don't really have to be a gift, they can be for your own everyday purchases, and imagine giving the church a donation every time you shop.

Some examples of how the church benefits:

If you give each of your four kids a Barnes & Noble \$25 gift card, it costs you \$100. The church gets \$8.00. The cards can be in the form of physical cards or e-cards. The physical cards you order will be shipped to our coordinator, Nancy Todd, who will pass them on to you.

Another example: You need a new spring jacket, so you plan to go to LL Bean. By purchasing it with a RaiseRight Gift Card, the church gets 16%. Wow!! That is \$16 for a \$100 jacket you were buying anyway. In addition, you can get gift cards for Stop & Shop, Shaws, and Whole Foods with the church getting a percentage when you buy food. Or what about that shopping trip to Lowes or Home Depot. The percentage varies by merchant from about 2.5% to 20%.

Using e-cards, you could get an e-card on your way out to dinner at one of the many restaurants that participate in the program.

#### **Here is the information:**

To order, go online to RaiseRight.com, click on "join a program" and enter BB483284315L1 as your enrollment code (to link to our church account). Place your order online and leave a check (made out to UCC, Burlington) in the gift card order mailbox outside the church office. You may also pay by linking a checking account or credit card and there will be a small fee.


#### EASTER PLANTS

#### **NEWS FROM THE PASTOR!**

Dear friends.

This past Saturday, February 17, members of our church's leadership met for this year's Leadership Retreat. Chairs of boards and committees met to discuss plans for the coming year, assess and evaluate the state of our congregation, and imagine the plans that God has for our church in the near and distant future.

#### Addressing the Budget Deficit

One of the main objectives of the meeting was to brainstorm thoughtful and meaningful ways to address our current budget deficit. We need to find a way to achieve long-term sustainable ministry. Our operating budget is already rather lean, so the only cuts we could make that would have a meaningful impact would be to cut staff or building expenses, both of which would greatly hamper the ministry we try to provide our congregation and community. This means that to address the budget deficit, the only way out is forwards: we need to bring in more money, and we could do this in three ways:

- 1. More pledges
- a. Increased pledges from current members
- b. New pledging units
- c. More rental income

More fundraising income

Coming out of the retreat, we plan to establish small task forces to explore how we can better generate rental income and fundraising income. These task forces will contact churches and nonprofits in the area that have been successful in these areas to research best practices. They will assess the programs and projects that we already have in place to see how we can maximize their effectiveness. They will also be tasked, with thinking creatively, about how we can bring in new renters and establish new fundraisers that not only generate income for our church, but also bring us closer together as a congregation and serve the community.

#### **Removing Barriers for Committee Participation**

We also discussed the need to attract more volunteers to participate in church leadership. Many of our church committees are currently understaffed. A lot of the work of running the church falls on a disproportionately small number of volunteers and our volunteers tend to be older folks whose workload should (hopefully) decrease in coming years as younger people step into these roles.

We shared the things we love about serving on committees, which included getting to know people, feeling a sense of purpose, learning new things, and simply answering God's call to serve. We also shared some of the things we don't like so much including the personal disconnection of zoom meetings, the amount of work and responsibility, and the training needed to participate effectively.

With these things in mind, we tried to come up with a new set of guidelines that will, hopefully, lower the barrier for participation on church boards and committees. Here are some examples:

#### Meetings will be scheduled at least a month in advance (and won't change at the last minute)

All groups and committees should try to meet on the same day and time every month (ex. Second Tuesday at 7pm). If your committee is having a hard time settling on a day, make a point to plan your meetings a month in advance. Make time in your agenda to schedule your next meeting.

#### All meetings will be 90 minutes or less

The expectation is that the chair of the committee will plan an agenda that can be completed in 90 minutes or less. If certain topics or conversations are going over their allotted time, the chair should try to either resolve the conversation, table it for later, or push other topics off to a later meeting. Once meetings hit the 90 minute mark, wrap the meeting - even if you didn't get everything done that you hoped to get done. Use it as a learning opportunity for future agendas and meetings.

#### All committees will make space during meetings for fun and faithfulness

Make intentional time during each meeting to check in with one another. There should be devotional and prayer time at each meeting. Try to use this time to reinforce the beautiful, sacred, and rewarding aspect of this work rather than business as usual. Make it interactive and participatory so members get to know each other better.

#### Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, Threats

One of the things we did was a SWOT exercise where we assessed our congregation's strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats. Here are just a few of the things that came out of this exercise:

#### **Strengths**

#### -Our staff

We have a dedicated and hardworking staff that cares deeply about the church and together amounts to more than the sum of their parts.

#### -Welcoming, Open and Affirming

-Our church is one of, if not the most, open and welcoming congregations in town. Aside from our history of being an open and affirming congregation, we welcome all newcomers with open arms and hearts.

#### -Kind, supportive, generous

All who come to our church can expect to find a kind, supportive, generous congregation. Whether in times of celebration or difficulty, our congregation is there for you with cards, visits, phone calls, and food.

#### -Facilities

We have a large building with the capacity to hold different types of events and activities. Our history is a strength.

#### Weaknesses

Community Awareness (Marketing, PR, Signage, Communication Strategy)

- -For a church that does so much in our community, a lot of it seems to go unnoticed by the larger community.
- -Additionally, we struggled to identify how people from the wider community view our church. Do they know our name? Do they know what we do? What values are important to us?

#### **Budget Deficit**

-Our church is in a difficult situation financially. We must address our budget deficit ASAP. Facilities

-Our facilities can be seen as a strength (as listed above) or as a weakness. Our building is expensive and requires quite a bit of maintenance.

#### Volunteers

-Many of our committees are currently understaffed. A lot of the work of running the church falls on a disproportionately small number of volunteers. Our volunteers tend to be older folks whose workload should decrease in coming years.

#### **Opportunities**

Connect more with local publications like BCAT and Burlington Buzz

-This is a communication strategy that hasn't yet been maximized.

#### Think further out geographically

-How can we reach out to people from surrounding towns - Woburn, Billerica, Bedford, etc.

Welcome Materials for newcomers to church and town

-We could put together a brochure that better describes who we are and what we do. We could also include a small gift (bread? knitted goods?) that highlights our kindness, generosity, and spirit of welcome.

Participate more in community activities

-Burlington Day, Truck Day, Halloween, Tree Lighting. Our church could have a presence at these town activities and informative materials to share with people.

#### **Threats**

Money insecurity

-Again, we have to try as best as we can to reach a more secure financial position.

#### **Encroaching Sunday morning activities**

-More than ever before, activities are scheduled on Sunday mornings, whether it's youth sports, brunch, or exercise class. Sunday mornings are no longer the exclusive domain of churches.

DE prioritization of church

-Similar to the above point, church is no longer a major priority for younger generations of people.

Lack of diversity

-Our church, as currently constructed, is not particularly racially diverse. It also does not reflect the demographic makeup of Burlington.

As you can see, there are lots of opportunities for us this coming year, and I hope we can address some of them to grow our church and expand our impact in our community. While there are certainly some serious issues facing our congregation (and churches in general) we are confronting them head on and taking steps to usher our church into another century of ministry. There are a lot of good things happening here and many reasons to hope. As ever, I trust that God has plans for us. May we answer God's call with courage and joy!
