Dear Church Family,

We are in the midst of stewardship season, which is often a time when we extol the virtues of the many diverse ministries of our church, the reason being that when reminded of the wonderful ministries our church provides, our generous members are all the more inspired to give generously. This may be true, and if you would like to refresh your self and your soul on the many ministries offered by our church, I encourage you to continue reading through the Hilltop. I trust you'll find something to encourage your generosity.

What I'd like to focus on during this stewardship season, and the thing that inspires my soul and increases my generosity, are the stories of God working in our lives and through our lives; stories of God's Spirit moving in unexpected places and through unexpected people; stories that we are sometimes hesitant to share because they defy logic and mortal understanding.

I know that many, many members of our church have such stories. I also know that many of those stories remain untold, or merely whispered about, or perhaps saved for just the right time and place when it needs to be spoken and shared. Several of my own stories could be categorized this way, including the one I shared in worship to kick off our stewardship season.

I don't often share the story of the cartoon snail that I told during worship. Part of me holds it so dear that I don't want to spend it as if it were cheap. There's another part of me that knows the story is unbelievable and wonders if people will think I'm a freak, or worse, a liar. It's not easy to share such stories; to make oneself vulnerable; to bear such precious and personal stories out into the open. It is risky, yes, but these risks produce the greatest rewards.

If we can't share these stories with our church family, then where can we? If our church family isn't gracious enough to hold such stories close to the heart, then what kind of family are we? I have complete faith that our church possesses sufficient grace, compassion, and open-heartedness to not only hear and hold such stories but to take them to heart and to allow ourselves to be inspired, encouraged, and transformed.

In the marketplace of giving in 2025, our church is not just competing with other churches for the hard-earned money, energy, and time of our members. We're competing with a vast landscape of other non-profit organizations and causes. The decision point will not be whether Ingathering, Sunday School, or Bible Study can prove themselves to be more compelling options than WBUR, the World Wildlife Fund, or UNICEF. The decision point does not – can not – exist on a spreadsheet or in a table of pros and cons.

For the community of faith, the decision point of whether we want to commit our time, talent, and treasure to our church is not a decision made as if we are walking down the cereal aisle in the grocery store with hundreds of choices before our eyes. The disciple is not a consumer. We do not decide to give to our church any more than we decide to love our neighbor, or feed the hungry, or care for the sick. It's not a decision at all but a truth written on our hearts.

So this stewardship season, you won't hear a pitch from me. I won't try to sell you on our church versus that church versus that non-profit organization. I just want to share our stories of faith, to remind us all that God is real and God is at work in our lives and that church – this church, *our* church – is the place we come to discuss, sing, pray, serve, and celebrate this truth.

May our eyes be opened to God's presence all around us. May our hearts be opened to receive God's grace. May we have the courage to share our faith stories of good news in our lives. May God bless our church family.

Aline will continue as the organist for the church, and I am so grateful I had the opportunity to partner with her. Always professional, prepared, with a vast repertoire of music, she was wonderful to work with, and I will miss our collaboration very much. Luckily, we will continue to work together with Andrew to bring you beautiful and thoughtful service music, but my presence will now be in the background.

FINAL THOUGHTS ABOUT OUR COFFEEHOUSE

There was a welcoming warmth that greeted audience members as they walked into Sewall Hall on Saturday, October 18. Whether it was the decorations that added color and festivity to the hall, the aroma of seasonal freshly baked goods or the amazing program that Deana Tredeau put together that highlighted the events of the evening as well as future events in the church, we rolled out the red carpet with grace, thoughtfulness, and hospitality that evening. And of course, the icing on the cake, the music, was wonderful. Along with talented musicians from our church Andrew Harris, Donna Desimone, Mark Omobono, Chris and Liz Silva and yours truly, we were joined by the talented Ben Silver, cantor from the Temple and Trina Portillo, Pastor from the Presbyterian Church. And as a special gift, our very own Keira Egan lifted the roof off the hall with her powerful performance as well. We will be watching her star rise with great enthusiasm as she continues to journey forward with her creative and outstanding talents. Everyone associated with the Coffeehouse volunteered and worked very hard to make it a special event and I thank you all for your contributions, your commitment to community, your time and talents and making music such a meaningful part of the life of our church. And, of course, we raised \$855 for our general fund free and clear which is certainly a bonus for our collaborative efforts.



Rev. Teri Motley will lead the service, including Communion, on November 2 as Andrew is away. November 2 is also All Saints Sunday; people can send the names of their saints who have passed in the last year to the office to be said aloud during the service.

Parish Council approved the use of memorial funds to purchase two picnic tables and a 'free library' box. They will be installed in the spring and be taken care of by the Green Team.



There was more discussion about encouraging volunteers to help with coffee hour. Coffee hour is a beloved tradition that we would like to continue, but it's become increasingly difficult. When no one signs up, the Deacons are left scrambling for help at the last minute. We just can't do that anymore. One idea was to have the lay leader ask for volunteers for specific slots for the next few Sundays on every Sunday or on Red Wagon Sunday. The Renter's Agreement template will be updated to require

renters to leave chairs and tables up in the coffee hour configuration before they leave. Another idea was to ask every family sign up to volunteer for something (coffee hour, nursery, worship activities, etc.) at least once a year.

A few changes have been made to make volunteering easier. One is that the host can use a 32 cup coffee pot, which is lighter and easier to handle. Another is that 'baker' has been changed to 'baker/snack provider.' If not liking to bake has been holding you back, leave your oven off and bring in cheese and crackers, cut up fruit, vegetables and dip or a store bought treat. Gentlemen, this includes you as well!

Tables and chairs will be set up already and typically there's lots of help with clean up. You do have to arrive a little before church to put on the coffee and set out any food brought in which doesn't need refrigeration.

Beginning sometime in November, if there's a Sunday when no one has signed up as host or baker/snack provider, then there won't be coffee or there'll be coffee but no treats.

Everyone's help is needed to continue to enjoy coffee hour. The sign up link is available in the weekly bulletin and the Hilltop Herald. You can always let Donna Flecchia or Bobbie know when you're available and what you'd like to do and they will add you to the schedule.

COME AND DECORATE THE SANCTUARY!

The Deacons will decorate the sanctuary for Thanksgiving on Saturday, November 1 and for Christmas on Saturday, November 29. The start time both days is 9 am and help from the congregation is appreciated.

There was discussion about Advent and Christmas Eve service planning and needs.

Our Tool/Blanket Sunday donations totaled \$517.38. Payment was made to Church World Service; founded in 1946, CWS works around the world with the vision that everyone has food, a voice and a safe place to call home. \$300 was paid to Alynne McLean, our Missions Sunday Speaker. Alynne is the Founder and President of Science with a Mission. "Our purpose is to combine scientific knowledge with Christian compassion. We are a non-profit, charitable organization dedicated to producing diagnostics for developing countries. We develop and distribute these diagnostic tools to enable accurate diagnosis and subsequent treatment of those afflicted."
